Summary of SBBC Lease with Sprint

Educational Broadband Licenses (EBS) Defined:

- EBS refers to Educational Broadband System. It was formerly called ITFS (Instructional Television Fixed Service).
- The FCC issued EBS licenses to school districts, colleges and libraries for transmission of educational content over 50 years ago.
- The School District has two license groups consisting of a total of eight channels, KTZ22 and KLC80. These licenses cover all of Broward County, and parts of Palm Beach and Miami-Dade County.
- BECON has been using the EBS channels since 1966 to provide instructional television programs to classrooms in all of the schools across the District.

Leasing Excess Capacity:

- In 2005, the FCC changed the designation of these channels from Instructional Television Fixed Service (ITFS) to Educational Broadband Service (EBS).
- With this change, the FCC made the licenses desirable and valuable to commercial wireless operators such as Sprint. Sprint leases this spectrum from educational license holders all across the country, and throughout Florida.
- The new FCC rules require license holders to transition from fixed video service to mobile broadband data service. This requires partnering with a wireless service provider such as Sprint.
- The FCC has guidelines for 30-year leases with commercial providers. Educators are permitted to lease spectrum for cash payments and service credits.
- Educators who lease spectrum are required to provide educational content and service to the community. This rule is referred to as: "Substantial Service"
- Educators remain the license holder, and maintain ownership of the license.

Determining the Value of the EBS Spectrum:

- In order to determine the present value of the EBS spectrum, SBBC retained Walters and Associates, a licensed appraiser, in 2012.
- Considering a variety of factors, including the FAU and Miami Dade leases as well as an FCC auction and potential income approach, Walters and Associates provided an appraisal of \$36.8 million or \$0.265 per MHz-POP.
- We used this appraised value to benchmark offers we receive from commercial partners
