FINAL ADOPTION - POLICY 6305

Administration of Medication/Treatments

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Current Policy 6305

- Medications: Over-The-Counter (OTC) and prescription medications require an Authorization for Medication/Treatment Form completed and signed by the physician and the parent/guardian
- Medications: OTC and prescription must be transported by the parent/guardian unless the student has a special health condition (F.S. 1002.20)



Current Policy 6305 (Continued)

- All medications are not to be transported on a school bus unless the student is accompanied by trained school personnel or has permission to self-administer emergency medications.
- All medications shall be received by school personnel from the parent/guardian.
- Medications received are counted (# of tablets or amount of liquid) and recorded on the Student Medication Log by school staff or onsite healthcare personnel.



Current Policy 6305 (Continued)

- All medications shall be properly labeled with the student's name and stored in the original container in a locked cabinet.
- A minimum of two people per school must be trained for administration of medications, even if there is an on-site health care personnel.



Policy 6305 Revisions Process

- Based on discussion points from Board members it was requested that staff revisit Policy 6305 regarding OTC medication in an effort to meet the needs of parents
- Task Force Committee representation: Principals (all grade levels), parent, social worker, Risk Management, Florida Department of Health, Doctor of Pharmacy, Nova SEU and Coordinated Student Health Services staff



Proposed Policy 6305 Changes

- Selected OTC Medications for grades 9-12 only with parental approval and for symptoms identified on the form include:
- 1. Acetaminophen (Tylenol)
- 2. Calcium Carbonate (Tums)
- 3. Ibuprofen (Advil/Motrin)
- 4. Midol
- 5. Allegra
- 6. Claritin
- 7. Lactaid



Selected OTC Medications for Grades 9-12 for Administration by School Personnel with Parental Approval Only

- Authorization: Parents must complete and sign an *Authorization for Selected OTC Medications with Parental Approval Only* Form. A new form is required every school year and when any changes are made in selected medications
- Administration: Only the selected medications listed on the form for symptoms identified will be administered according to the manufacturer's labeled instructions
 - Selected medications shall be received from the parent/ guardian in the original sealed container, counted and recorded on the Student Medication Log
 - Selected OTC meds will be stored in the school clinic in a locked cabinet and supervised and administered by school personnel.
- **Training:** School personnel must complete an on-line medication training. School personnel may opt out of the responsibility for administering selected OTC medication to students.



Selected OTC Medications For Administration By School Personnel with Parental Approval Only

Talking Points from Committee

- Locked cabinets will require an increase in the number of cabinets for storage of OTC medications resulting in a cost impact to schools
- Burden on school personnel for administration of selected OTC medications – Schools have decreased the # of clerical staff available – budgetary impact
- High school principal concerned about the large number of medications to be administered by staff to students.
- Increase burden and liability that is placed on staff to assist with medication administration



Final Adoption - Major Proposed Policy 6305 Changes

- Administration of Selected OTC Medications with parental approval only for students in grades 9-12.
- Selected OTC medications with parental approval:
 Administration by School Personnel. School personnel may opt out of the responsibility for administering selected OTC medications to students.
- Extenuating Circumstances: Considerations of parental request outside the rules in Policy 6305 for OTC medication administration for all grade levels.



Final Adoption - Major Proposed Policy 6305 Changes (Continued)

 Self-carry and self-administration by student of OTC topical products: sunscreen, bug repellents (i.e., wipes, lotions) NO AEROSOL SPRAYS OR PUMP PRODUCTS

Right, Rules and Responsibilities of Use, Possession, Sale,
 Transmittal of OTC medications



Self-Carry and Self-Administration by Student of OTC Topical Products

Students in all grade levels may self-carry and self-administer sunscreen, bug repellents (i.e., wipes, lotions). NO AEROSOL SPRAY OR PUMP PRODUCTS are allowed

Student's parent/guardian is responsible for provision and safety of products being self-administered by their child:

- Providing education/instruction on use/self-administering
- Age-appropriate according to manufacturer's label



Self-carry and Self-Administration by student of OTC topical products (Continued)

• Safe for their child to self-carry and self-administer during the school day, while students are away from school property, engaged within field trips, and/or other school-sponsored events



Right, Rules and Responsibilities of Use, Possession, Sale, Transmittal of OTC medications

Parents/guardian and student must familiarize themselves of right, rules and responsibilities of use, possession, sale, transmittal of over-the-counter medications, as outlined in The Code Book for Student Conduct



Extenuating Circumstances for considerations of parental request for Selected OTC medications

- Parents may make requests for administration of an overthe-counter medication that requires consideration outside of the rules outlined within this policy
- Requests should be made through their school principal for administration of an OTC medication by trained school personnel, or self-carry and self-administration by student
- Requests will be reviewed and approved by the Coordinated Student Health Services Department



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
