2019-2020 EDUCATIONAL EQUITY ACT PLAN The School Board of Broward County, Florida

The responsibilities of the Florida Department of Education, Office of Equal Educational Opportunity (OEEO) include compliance oversight of the Florida Educational Equity Act, Section 1000.05, Florida Statutes, and other federal and state legislation relating to equity in education.

The Florida Educational Equity Act (FEEA), and other federal and state legislation such as Title IX, Title VI, Title II (ADAAA), Section 504, prohibit discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, disability, age or marital status against students and employees. The FEEA and the State Board of Education Rules 6A-19.001 – 19.010 require OEEO to monitor public school districts' compliance with the statute. The annual Educational Equity Update is a reporting tool that enables the OEEO to monitor and ensure adherence to provisions of the laws, and that educational resources are equitably distributed.

For 2019-2020, Districts will continue to focus on increasing minority enrollment in Advanced Placement (AP), including International Baccalaureate (IB), and Advanced International Certification of Education (AICE), Dual Enrollment (DE), Honors and other Level 3 courses. The Districts should evaluate progress over the last five-year period, from 2015-16 to 2019-20. In addition, beginning with 2016-2017, Districts are required to report enrollment data for students identified as English Language Learners (ELL). The plan is divided into seven (7) parts and includes the following:

For the 2019-2020 Annual Update, districts will evaluate the effectiveness of their methods and strategies according to data-driven evidence of success based on the 2015-16 benchmark data and accountability measures through 2019-20 in the following program areas:

- (1) Increasing the percentage of Black, Hispanic, Black male, and Hispanic male students enrolled in Advanced Placement (AP), International Baccalaureate (IB) and Advanced International Certificate of Education (AICE) courses (Grades 9-12).
- (2) Increasing the percentage of Black, Hispanic, Black male, and Hispanic male students enrolled in Dual Enrollment (DE) courses (9-12).
- (3) Increasing the overall percentage of Black, Hispanic, Black male, and Hispanic male students enrolled in advanced high school courses, including AP, IB, AICE, DE, honors and other Level 3 courses.
- (4) Identifying English Language Learners (ELL) students in all the above mentioned courses.

Section – 1 Grades 9-12, AP/IB/AICE Courses

EVALUATION OF METHODS AND STRATEGIES

The following percentages reflect within race/ethnicity calculations for students enrolled in AP/IB/AICE courses. In 2015-16, 35% of Whites, 16% of Blacks, and 30% of Hispanics, 31% of White Male, 11% of Black Male, and 26% of Hispanic Male were enrolled. In 2019-20, 38% of Whites (an increase of 3 percentage points), 18% of Blacks (an increase of 2 percentage points), 31% of Hispanics (an increase of 1 percentage points), 33% of White Males (an increase of 2 percentage points), 14% of Black Males (an increase of 3 percentage points), and 27% of Hispanic Males (an increase of 1 percentage points) were enrolled.

The evaluation reveals progress in increasing enrollment in AP/IB/AICE courses for Black and Hispanic students in grade 9-12th. Black students increased by 2 percentage points, from 16% in 2015-16 to 18% in 2019-20; Hispanic students also increased by 1 percentage points, from 30% to 31% for the same time period.

Methods and Strategies for Continued Elimination of Enrollment Gaps:

- The high school AP team consisting of the principal, assistant principal, guidance staff and department heads will monitor the participation and performance of Black, Hispanic, Black male and Hispanic male students enrolled in Advanced Placement (AP), International Baccalaureate (IB), and Advanced International Certificate of Education (AICE) courses in grades 9-12.
- 2. The high school AP team consisting of the principal, assistant principal, guidance staff and department heads will monitor the participation and performance of Black, Hispanic, Black male and Hispanic male students enrolled in Dual Enrollment courses.
- 3. The high school AP team will identify achievements gaps in incoming 9th grade students. In conjunction with the middle schools they will develop strategies to narrow and eliminate these gaps at the middle school level.
- 4. Continued use of AP Potential for identification of AP ready students and subsequent enrollment in AP courses.
- Develop a District monitoring tool and reporting procedures for AP enrollment in low income schools. Ensure schools have properly placed all students in appropriate AP courses using the AP Potential tool.
- 6. Encourage and support school based initiatives to increase parent awareness of AP, IB and AICE courses.
- AP teachers will participate in the Local Advanced Placement Credentialing program which focuses on improving teacher content-area knowledge and advanced pedagogical practices.

Accountability Measures:

- Develop procedures to create and monitor individual school AP enrollment at the beginning of the school year. Ensure all AP Potential students are enrolled in the appropriate AP course.
- 2. Continually monitor AP enrollment to measure corrections in AP enrollment through the use of school enrollment reports.
- 3. Develop a District assessment tool to assist schools in evaluating their Advanced Placement Program.

EVALUATION OF METHODS AND STRATEGIES

The following percentages reflect within race/ethnicity calculations for students enrolled in Dual Enrollment Courses. In 2015-16, 9% of Whites, 5% of Blacks, and 7% of Hispanics, 7% of White Males, 3% Black Males, and 5% of Hispanic Males were enrolled. In 2019-20, 16% of Whites (an increase of 7 percentage points), 11% of Blacks (an increase of 6 percentage points), 11% of Hispanics (an increase of 4 percentage points), 13% of White Males (an increase of 6 percentage points), 7% of Black Males (an increase of 4 percentage points), and 9% of Hispanic Males (an increase of 4 percentage points) were enrolled.

Black students increased by 6 percentage points, from 5% in 2015-16 to 11% in 2019-20; Hispanic student also increase by 4 percentage points from 7% to 11% for the same time period.

EVALUATION OF METHODS AND STRATEGIES

The following percentages reflect within race/ethnicity calculations for students enrolled in all Level 3 Courses. In 2015-16, 75% of Whites, 53% of Blacks, and 68% of Hispanics, 71% of White Males, 44% of Black Males, and 63% of Hispanic Males were enrolled. In 2019-20, 79% of Whites (an increase of 4 percentage points), 60% of Black (an increase of 7 percentage points), 71% of Hispanics (an increase of 3 percentage points), 75% of White Males (an increase of 4 percentage points), 53 % of Black Males (an increase of 9 percentage points), and 71 % of Hispanic Males (an increase of 3 percentage points) were enrolled.

Black students increased by 7 percentage points, from 53 % in 2015-16 to 60 % in 2019-20; Hispanic students also increased by 3 percentage points from 68% to 71% for the same time period.

The District currently has three different locations that offer assistance and guidance to pregnant and parenting students (Charles Drew Resource Center is a part of Dave Thomas Education Center, Henry D. Perry Education Center, and Seagull Alternative High School.) Contact persons for this area are: Ms. Tracy Lockhart-Talley, Principal, Charles Drew Resource Center/Dave Thomas Education Center, Bardetta D. Haygood, Principal, Henry D. Perry Education Center, and Mr. Kelvin Lee, Principal, Seagull Alternative High School. The following pages provides the District's response to the above three (3) questions from each location:

Charles Drew Resource Center/Dave Thomas Education Center

1) How does the district make provisions for pregnant students to complete the coursework necessary to earn a high school diploma? How are ancillary services (such as childcare, health care, social services, parent education, and transportation) provided?

The teen parent program at Charles Drew Family Resource Center is a part of Dave Thomas Education Center, an alternative school that provides an educational opportunity for parenting teens in the north area of Broward County. A small staff instructs students in grades 7-12 in all subjects required for promotion and high school graduation. A competency-based curriculum, aligned to state standards, is used for students to earn credits and prepare students for assessments such as: BEST, FSA, and EOC's.

Additionally, each student receives 15-20 minutes of whole group instruction that focuses on a specific standard or area of concern at the beginning of each class. Through this program the students can work at his/her pace to complete courses required for graduation. Additionally, the students have the luxury of having their child(ren) on the campus while they are receiving their education. The teen parent child(ren) receives free quality childcare from our caregivers in the school's nursery. Learning is extended to the babies of the teen mothers by using the Creative Curriculum that prepares them for elementary school.

The teen parents and babies receive wrap around services from various members of the staff, district support staff and outside agencies. On-site staff includes a guidance counselor, speech pathologist, ESE Specialist, child development center director, security specialist, two campus monitors and an armed safe school officer. A full-time registered nurse and a part-time social worker, work collaboratively to ensure students are receiving inhouse referrals, as well as outside agency referrals to address their various needs, i.e.: WIC, food stamps, child support, supportive counseling, parenting and childbirth education classes, an established and close working relationship between the director and the teen parents, and a healthy start coordinator for parenting skills, childbirth, and 'mommy and me' classes.

The teen parents are provided with bus transportation provided by BCPS. The students are picked up and dropped off in front of their houses. The teen students may borrow a car seat if needed for the school year to ensure their babies are safe during the bus ride.

2) If the district operates a separate program for pregnant and parenting students, how are students informed of the different curricula, services, or other options available through the program versus what is available to students not in the program? (Please attach brochure (s) used to inform pregnant and parenting students of their educational options).

The district support counselor and the school's social worker continually communicate with home school staff about referrals into the program. Some of the teen parents are enrolled in a self -esteem group that is utilized as a safe place to encourage and support each other and share challenges that they face as teen moms.

Members of the guidance team conduct presentations that explain the program to schools in our feeder pattern. The school's website and brochures are used to inform the public about the offerings available in the program. Additionally, the Women of Tomorrow program has been established for girls in need of a mentor. The mentor visits once a month to discuss academics, future goals, and job placement following graduation.

3) How are school counselors and administrators trained to effectively advise pregnant or parenting students of their options to participate in regular classroom activities or enroll in a special program, and their access to curricular, extracurricular, and ancillary service programs?

Our school counselors and administrators receive ongoing staff development from district staff, school social worker, Amanda's Place staff, and the Healthy Start nurse. These trainings provide staff with the necessary tools to address the various needs of our teen parent population.

Henry D. Perry Education Center

1) How does the district make provisions for pregnant and parenting students to complete the course work necessary to earn a high school diploma? How are ancillary services (such as child care, health care, social services, parent education, and transportation) provided?

Henry D. Perry Education Center follows the Florida Department of Education's graduation plan. In our efforts to adhere to this plan, we offer multiple diploma options as well as the flexible scheduling for our students. Because we are a credit recovery school and fall under Policy 1003.53 which governs alternative and dropout prevention programs, our students are able to earn credits in a competency-based system, often leading to students recovering deficient credits and still meeting their cohort graduation timeline. Schedule changes are done as students complete courses allowing them to immediately move on to the next course needed in their graduation plan.

Full time childcare is offered at no cost to our students/parents. Wraparound services for our parents/students and their children include parenting courses and seminars though Memorial Healthcare. In addition, we work with Memorial and their partnering agencies to provide medical assistance and healthcare to our parents/students, often assisting with insurance needs when there is no medical insurance currently on record. We have 2 full time School Social Workers and 2 Family Counselors available for our students. Broward County Schools' transportation is available to our parents/students and their children. A car seat is provided for each child to ensure their safety as they are transported each day.



There is not a specific curricula established that separates parents/students from traditional students without children. They must meet the same graduation requirements based on their diploma option. However, the methods in which we reach these curricula needs differs from traditional schools in that credits are earned through a competency-based system. Through this method, we are able to meet each parent/student's individual curricula needs when it comes to scheduling and wraparound services.

3) How are school counselors and administrators trained to effectively advise pregnant or parenting students of their options to participate in regular classroom activities or enroll in a special program, and their access to curricular, extracurricular and ancillary service programs?

Administrators, school counselors, social workers, and family counselor all attend district training related to credit evaluation, testing, and graduation requirements. In addition, staff is trained in the Rtl process in order to assist our parents/students should they be experiencing needs beyond what is traditionally address at a Tier 1 level for all students. Schools counselors, school social workers, and family counselors attend monthly district teen parents seminars and guidance trainings. Daily announcements are made to inform students of activities and events. Quarterly club days are scheduled to allow students to learn about our clubs and provide opportunities for them to join.

Upon enrollment at Seagull, every student meets with a certified school counselor that reviews transcripts and graduation requirements/goals. During the consultation, diploma options and course offerings are discussed. Students and parents are advised that Seagull is a competency-based, work at your own pace program whereby credits or courses may be earned or completed prior to the close of the marking period or quarter unlike traditional schools. Students are also advised about the childcare services and requirements to enroll their baby/toddler in the program.

Additionally, student orientations are held quarterly where essential staff (i.e. administration, guidance, support services, etc.) present an overview of services performed by that department.

3. How are school counselors and administrators trained to effectively advise pregnant or parenting students of their options to participate in regular classroom activities or enroll in a special program, and their access to curricular, extracurricular and ancillary service programs?

School counselors and administrators follow state and district directives/memorandums regarding changes and procedures for all programs including pregnant and teen parent programs. Additionally, information is shared during monthly department chair/leadership team meetings with administration, Literacy, STEM, coaches, SAC chair, guidance/ESE, social services and childcare departments to review, update, train on policies/procedures relevant to the disciplines.

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
