"Schools are making heroic efforts to get children food, but they're not able to do it alone," said Joel Berg, the chief executive officer of the New York City-based nonprofit. "How long can families survive with this level of hunger? They're hanging on now, but every week it's going to get worse."

Dear Potential Donor:

In response to the unprecedented impact of the Covid-19 threat, Broward County Public Schools (BCPS) Board and staff have taken many proactive steps to mitigate the many anticipated difficulties that students and families will experience. BCPS has faced the monumental challenge of transitioning to distance learning, while maintaining high-quality instruction, along with the unexpected costs of providing expanded meal services to students and families in the wake of school closures. Holding firm to the commitment that *Schools may not be open*, *but Learning Never Closes in BCPS*, the District has mobilized quickly to:

- ✓ Distributed more than 90,000 electronic devices to students to facilitate online learning
- ✓ Distributing **48,000** book packs, from Scholastic, to create home libraries for Pre-K through 2nd grade students
- ✓ Negotiated with AT&T and Comcast to offer **discounted and free internet service** and mobile hot spots for low income families and those with housing instability and financial hardship
- ✓ Served more than *One Million* meals (as of May 6, 2020) to students and their families since mid-March 2020

BCPS serves more than **268,000** students, with **63.3%** of our children eligible for free or reduced lunch meals. According to a nationally representative survey of 1,025 families from Hunger Free America, in the last month, more than a third of parents reported skipping entire meals for their children or cutting the size of servings because they did not have enough money for food (*Education Week, April 2020*). In

accordance with the Families First Coronavirus Response Act of 2020, the Federal government has granted a nationwide waiver allowing parents and/or guardians to pick up meals for their children, without the student needing to be present – and often times, the parents are asking for meals as well.

The Food and Nutrition Services team at Broward County Public Schools (BCPS) has been working diligently to help students and their families by serving grab and go meals at fifty-one (51) school sites. The Federal government reimburses the District for student meals, however adult meals are *not reimbursed* in any amount with an approximate added cost to the District of more than \$30,000 per week, while we anticipate a catastrophic budget shortfall in the \$120-\$200 million unless federal stimulus dollars are provided. 




