Third Amendment to Extend Interlocal Agreement with Broward County Government for Joint Comprehensive School Recycling Services

REQUESTED ACTION:

Approve the Third Amendment to the Interlocal Agreement to extend the recycling services program for the upcoming school year, July 1, 2005 - June 30, 2006.

SUMMARY EXPLANATION AND BACKGROUND:

On October 19, 1999, The School Board of Broward County, Florida approved a multi-year interlocal agreement with Broward County Government to provide a comprehensive recycling program at all schools and administrative sites. This agreement was extended through the First Amendment by The School Board of Broward County, Florida and the Broward County Board of Commissioners on June 18, 2002, through the 2003-04 school year. The Second Amendment extended comprehensive paper/cardboard recycling services to all public schools and administrative sites through the 2004-05 school year. The Third Amendment extends the recycling contract and services through the 2005-06 school year. Broward County Government will be submitting comprehensive recycling services for open bid during the 2005-06 year. The financial impact to the school system for recycling services has remained unchanged since the 2002-03 school year.

The agreement has been approved as to form by the School Board Attorney. (Summary Explanation and Background continued)

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

The financial impact to the school district is \$467,000 for 2005-06 school year. This cost has remained unchanged since 2002. The source of funds is the District's Waste Management/Utility Account.

The recycling program is a joint cooperative effort between The School Board of Broward County, Florida and Broward County Government. Both parties seek to support Florida's Solid Waste Reduction Act of 1988, and promote recycling as a viable method of waste reduction.

In July 1992, The School Board of Broward County, Florida initiated a comprehensive recycling program with Broward County Government. Since its inception, the program has recycled in excess of 43,676,000 pounds of paper and cardboard products. Through the interlocal agreement, the following services are provided by Broward County Government during the 2004-05 school year:

 Perform contract administration tasks including customer service/liaison with collection contractor, program route sheet review, data entry and management and collection complaint resolution.

Delivered 1,280 classroom recycling bins and plastic container bags to schools.

Broward County Board of Commissioners and The School Board of Broward County, Florida
partnered the successful America Recycles Day 2004 schools group pledge. Delivered more than
38,000 student and staff pledges from 70 schools, breaking Broward School's and America Recycles
Day pledge national record.

Conducted 18 special recycling pickups made on behalf of schools.

Received and resolved 157 complaints regarding recycling pickups.

On-site weekly pickup of commingled paper products at schools and locations by contract vendor,
 Waste Management Inc.

Supply paper recycling dumpster containers to all schools and administrative sites.

- Inputting the daily route sheets provided by Waste Management to track the number of collections and maintain inventory of the number and type of recycling containers used to collect materials.
- Publish bi-quarterly Recycling Report Card that lists recycling tonnages for each school and facility.
 Elementary and middle school students receive the quarterly Trash Talk newsletter through the Office of Integrated Waste Management.
- Student recycling aides from the Office of Integrated Waste Management provide presentations to School Board staff and students, deliver program literature and promotional materials. During FY 2004-05, student recycling aides trained 10,329 students and School Board staff on recycling and waste reduction activities. The student recycling aides monitor program collections and work with school staffs to resolve program issues and problems.

The comprehensive joint recycling program is recognized as a national model. The program has received the following national and regional awards:

The past two school years, the school system has recycled approximately 7,600,000 pounds of cardboard and paper, the equivalent of 3,802 tons. Our students are taught that sixteen trees make one ton of virgin paper. Through recycling, students are actively engaged in preserving our ecosystem, over 60,000 trees were saved in the last two years alone.

Summary Explanation and Background continued F-3
June 7, 2005

Recycling is a labor-intensive endeavor. The expectation is that recycling service will be provided free of charge. Strong markets exist for aluminum cans and plastic bottles when they can be delivered to market in significant quantities. Market prices for commingled paper products do not cover the costs of recycling services. However, due to ongoing cost control efforts, the cost for our paper/cardboard recycling services has not increased the past two years. There is no increase in recycling costs for the 2005-06 school year. Broward County Government will act on the agreement at their Commission meeting on June 14, 2005.

This is a Third Amendment to the Agreement ("Agreement") between BROWARD COUNTY ("COUNTY"), a political subdivision of the State of Florida, by and through its Board of County Commissioners, hereinafter referred to as "COUNTY,"

AND

The SCHOOL BOARD OF BROWARD COUNTY, FLORIDA, hereinafter referred to as the "SCHOOL BOARD."

WHEREAS, the COUNTY and SCHOOL BOARD entered into an Agreement for recycling services under the Broward County Recycling Program, on October 26, 1999, which was amended by the First Amendment, dated June 25, 2002, and further amended by the Second Amendment, dated June 8, 2004 (collectively "Agreement"); and

WHEREAS, the current Agreement expires on June 30, 2005; and

WHEREAS, the parties desire to amend the Agreement to provide for an additional one year term; NOW, THEREFORE,

IN CONSIDERATION of the mutual promises and covenants contained herein, and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto hereby agree to amend the Agreement as follows:

1. The foregoing recitals are true and correct and incorporated herein by reference.

- 2. Article 6, entitled "TERM AND TERMINATION," subsections 6.1 and 6.2 of the Agreement are hereby amended to read as follows:
 - 6.1 The term of this Agreement shall begin on the date it is fully executed by both parties and shall end on June 30, 2005 2006.
 - 6.2 All duties, obligations, and responsibilities required by this Agreement shall be completed no later than June 30, 2005 2006. Time shall be deemed to be of the essence in performing the duties, obligations and responsibilities required by this Agreement.
- 3. The effective date of this Third Amendment shall be on the date it is fully executed by both parties.
- 4. Except as set forth herein, all of the terms and conditions contained within the Agreement, as amended, shall remain in full force and effect and are incorporated herein by reference.
- 5. In the event of any conflict or ambiguity between this Amendment and the Agreement, the parties hereto hereby agree that this document shall control.
- 6. Capitalized terms not otherwise defined herein shall have the meanings set forth in the Agreement.
- 7. This document incorporates and includes all prior negotiations, correspondence, conversations, agreements, and understandings applicable to the matters contained herein and the parties agree that there are no commitments, agreements, or understandings concerning the subject matter of this document that are not contained in this document. Accordingly, the parties agree that no deviation from the terms hereof shall be predicated upon any prior representations or agreements, whether oral or written.
- 8. Preparation of the Agreement, as amended, has been a joint effort of SCHOOL BOARD and COUNTY and the resulting document shall not, solely as a matter of judicial construction, be construed more severely against one of the parties than any other.
- 9. Except as set forth in the Agreement, as amended, no modification, amendment, or alteration in the terms or conditions contained in the Agreement, as amended, shall be effective unless contained in a written document and executed by the parties hereto.

- 10. SCHOOL BOARD hereby irrevocably submits to the jurisdiction of Florida's state or federal courts in any action or proceeding arising out of or relating to the Agreement, as amended and hereby irrevocably agrees that all claims in respect to such action or proceeding may be heard and determined in Broward County, Florida, the venue situs. The parties agree that the Agreement, as amended, shall be construed and interpreted according to the laws of the State of Florida. To encourage prompt and equitable resolution of any litigation that may arise hereunder, the parties hereby waive any rights either may have to a trial by jury of any such litigation.
- 11. In the event the Agreement, as amended, or a portion of the Agreement, as amended, is found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, the remaining provisions shall continue to be effective unless COUNTY or SCHOOL BOARD elects to terminate the Agreement. The election to terminate the Agreement based upon this provision shall be made within seven (7) days after the finding by the court becomes final.
- 12. The truth and accuracy of each "Whereas" clause set forth above is acknowledged by the parties.
- 13. This Amendment may be executed in up to three (3) counterparts, each of which shall be deemed to be an original.



Putney's kid's efforts have not gone unnoticed; the City of Coconut Creek dedicated a sign at the site to mark the street "adopted" by the students and donated butterfly t-shirts to the children. Choice Medical Centers and Waste and Recycling Services have also jumped on board and are assisting the kids with their project. "If a class of thirty-one kids can make this much of a difference, imagine what an entire community can do," said Putney.
