TITLE:	Fourth Amendment to Extend Interlocal Agreement with Broward County Government for Joint Comprehensive Recycling Services		
REQUESTED ACTION:	Approve the Fourth Amendment to the Interlocal Agreement to extend recycling services from July 1, 2006, through September 30, 2006.		
SUMMARY EXPLANATION AND BACKGROUND:	<p>During the last week in April, Broward County Government released an invitation to bid for Recycling Services for Broward County Schools, Government Facilities and Colleges. A pre-bid conference was held on May 2, 2006, and an addendum released on May 9, 2006. Bids are scheduled to be opened on May 23, 2006. The current recycling agreement with Broward County Government expires on June 30, 2006. Broward County has requested an extension of the agreement for a maximum of three months through September 30, 2006. The extension is requested due to bid evaluation procedures including ensuring all bids are consistent with the county's women/minority enterprise goals and living wage ordinance. Further, a transition period will exist if a new vendor is selected for the recycling program. The extension of the current contract through September 30, 2006, ensures that recycling services will not be interrupted prior to the conclusion of the bid selection and contractual process. A new recycling contract between The School Board of Broward County, Florida and Broward County will be presented to the respective elected board prior to September 30, 2006.</p> <p>Since 1992-93, Broward County Government has provided recycling services to public schools. Approximately 220 schools and administrative facilities receive regular collection pick-ups. This agreement has been approved as to form by the School Board Attorney.</p>

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

This is a Fourth Amendment to the Interlocal Agreement between BROWARD COUNTY ("COUNTY"), a political subdivision of the State of Florida, by and through its Board of County Commissioners, hereinafter referred to as "COUNTY,"

AND

The SCHOOL BOARD OF BROWARD COUNTY, FLORIDA, hereinafter referred to as the "SCHOOL BOARD."

WHEREAS, the COUNTY and SCHOOL BOARD entered into an Interlocal Agreement for recycling services under the Broward County Recycling Program, on October 26, 1999, which was amended by the First Amendment, dated June 25, 2002, the Second Amendment, dated June 8, 2004 and the Third Amendment, dated June 14, 2005 (collectively "Agreement"); and

WHEREAS, the Agreement expires on June 30, 2006; and

WHEREAS, the parties desire to amend the Agreement to provide for an extension of the term; NOW, THEREFORE,

IN CONSIDERATION of the mutual promises and covenants contained herein, and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto hereby agree to amend the Agreement as follows:

1. The foregoing recitals are true, correct and incorporated into this Amendment by this reference.
2. Article 6, entitled "TERM AND TERMINATION," subsections 6.1 and 6.2 of the Agreement are hereby amended to read as follows:

- 6.1 The term of this Agreement shall begin on the date it is fully executed by both parties and shall end on ~~June~~ September 30, 2006.
- 6.2 All duties, obligations, and responsibilities required by this Agreement shall be completed no later than ~~June~~ September 30, 2006. Time shall be deemed to be of the essence in performing the duties, obligations and responsibilities required by this Agreement.
3. The effective date of this Fourth Amendment to Interlocal Agreement shall be on the date it is fully executed by both parties.
4. Except as set forth herein, all of the terms and conditions contained within the Interlocal Agreement, as amended, shall remain in full force and effect and are incorporated herein by reference.
5. In the event of any conflict or ambiguity between this Fourth Amendment and the Interlocal Agreement, the parties hereto hereby agree that this document shall control.
6. This Amendment may be executed in up to four (4) counterparts, each of which shall be deemed to be an original.
7. **Background Screening.** COUNTY agrees to comply with all requirements of Sections 1012.32 and 1012.465, Florida Statutes, and that COUNTY and all of its personnel who (1) are to be permitted access to school grounds when students are present, (2) will have direct contact with students, or (3) have access or control of school funds will successfully complete the background screening required by the referenced statutes and meet the standards established by the statutes. This background screening will be conducted by SCHOOL BOARD in advance of COUNTY or its personnel providing any services under the conditions described in the previous sentence. COUNTY will bear the cost of acquiring the background screening required by Section 1012.32, Florida Statutes, and any fee imposed by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement to maintain the fingerprints provided with respect to COUNTY and its personnel. The Parties agree that the failure of COUNTY to perform any of the duties described in this section shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement entitling SCHOOL BOARD to terminate immediately with no further responsibilities or duties to perform under this Agreement. To the extent permitted by law, COUNTY agrees to indemnify and hold harmless SCHOOL BOARD, its officers and employees from any liability in the form of physical or mental injury, death or property damage resulting in COUNTY'S failure to comply with the requirements of this section or Sections 1012.32 and 1012.465, Florida Statutes. Nothing herein shall be construed as a waiver by COUNTY or SCHOOL BOARD of sovereign immunity or of any rights conferred by Section 768.28, Florida Statutes.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the parties hereto have made and executed this Fourth Amendment to Interlocal Agreement for Joint Comprehensive Recycling Program on the respective dates under each signature: BROWARD COUNTY through its BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS, signing by and through its Mayor or Vice Mayor, authorized to execute same by Board action on the 20th day of June, 2006, and the SCHOOL BOARD OF BROWARD COUNTY, FLORIDA, signing by and through its Chairperson, duly authorized to execute same.

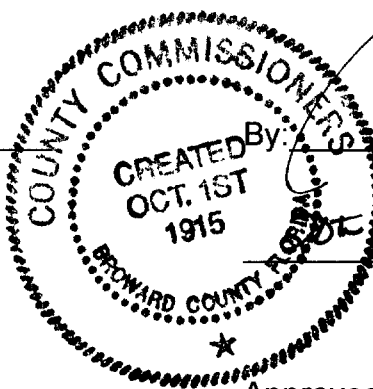





Third Amendment to Extend Interlocal Agreement with Broward County Government for Joint Comprehensive School Recycling Services

REQUESTED ACTION:

Approve the Third Amendment to the Interlocal Agreement to extend the recycling services program for the upcoming school year, July 1, 2005 – June 30, 2006.

SUMMARY EXPLANATION AND BACKGROUND:

On October 19, 1999, The School Board of Broward County, Florida approved a multi-year interlocal agreement with Broward County Government to provide a comprehensive recycling program at all schools and administrative sites. This agreement was extended through the First Amendment by The School Board of Broward County, Florida and the Broward County Board of Commissioners on June 18, 2002, through the 2003-04 school year. The Second Amendment extended comprehensive paper/cardboard recycling services to all public schools and administrative sites through the 2004-05 school year. The Third Amendment extends the recycling contract and services through the 2005-06 school year. Broward County Government will be submitting comprehensive recycling services for open bid during the 2005-06 year. The financial impact to the school system for recycling services has remained unchanged since the 2002-03 school year.

The agreement has been approved as to form by the School Board Attorney.



The recycling program is a joint cooperative effort between The School Board of Broward County, Florida and Broward County Government. Both parties seek to support Florida's Solid Waste Reduction Act of 1988, and promote recycling as a viable method of waste reduction.

In July 1992, The School Board of Broward County, Florida initiated a comprehensive recycling program with Broward County Government. Since its inception, the program has recycled in excess of 43,676,000 pounds of paper and cardboard products. Through the interlocal agreement, the following services are provided by Broward County Government during the 2004-05 school year:

- Perform contract administration tasks including customer service/liaison with collection contractor, program route sheet review, data entry and management and collection complaint resolution.
- Delivered 1,280 classroom recycling bins and plastic container bags to schools.
- Broward County Board of Commissioners and The School Board of Broward County, Florida partnered the successful America Recycles Day 2004 schools group pledge. Delivered more than 38,000 student and staff pledges from 70 schools, breaking Broward School's and America Recycles Day pledge national record.
- Conducted 18 special recycling pickups made on behalf of schools.
- Received and resolved 157 complaints regarding recycling pickups.
- On-site weekly pickup of commingled paper products at schools and locations by contract vendor, Waste Management Inc.
- Supply paper recycling dumpster containers to all schools and administrative sites.
- Inputting the daily route sheets provided by Waste Management to track the number of collections and maintain inventory of the number and type of recycling containers used to collect materials.
- Publish bi-quarterly Recycling Report Card that lists recycling tonnages for each school and facility. Elementary and middle school students receive the quarterly Trash Talk newsletter through the Office of Integrated Waste Management.
- Student recycling aides from the Office of Integrated Waste Management provide presentations to School Board staff and students, deliver program literature and promotional materials. During FY 2004-05, student recycling aides trained 10,329 students and School Board staff on recycling and waste reduction activities. The student recycling aides monitor program collections and work with school staffs to resolve program issues and problems.

The comprehensive joint recycling program is recognized as a national model. The program has received the following national and regional awards:

- U.S. Conference of Mayors National Recycling in Schools Program for Innovative Recycling and Environmental Education Programs
- South Florida EEO Awards for Environmental Action
- U.S. Conference of Mayors National Leadership Awards/National Office paper Recycling Program Award for Effective Employees Education and Environmental Tracking
- Recycle Florida Today's Best School Recycling Program
- Keep Florida Beautiful Annual Environmental Public Service Award

The past two school years, the school system has recycled approximately 7,600,000 pounds of cardboard and paper, the equivalent of 3,802 tons. Our students are taught that sixteen trees make one ton of virgin paper. Through recycling, students are actively engaged in preserving our ecosystem, over 60,000 trees were saved in the last two years alone.

Recycling is a labor-intensive endeavor. The expectation is that recycling service will be provided free of charge. Strong markets exist for aluminum cans and plastic bottles when they can be delivered to market in significant quantities. Market prices for commingled paper products do not cover the costs of recycling services. However, due to ongoing cost control efforts, the cost for our paper/cardboard recycling services has not increased the past two years. There is no increase in recycling costs for the 2005-06 school year. Broward County Government will act on the agreement at their Commission meeting on June 14, 2005.

WHEREAS, the parties desire to amend the Agreement to provide for an additional one year term; NOW, THEREFORE,

IN CONSIDERATION of the mutual promises and covenants contained herein, and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto hereby agree to amend the Agreement as follows:

1. The foregoing recitals are true and correct and incorporated herein by reference.

2. Article 6, entitled "TERM AND TERMINATION," subsections 6.1 and 6.2 of the Agreement are hereby amended to read as follows:
 - 6.1 The term of this Agreement shall begin on the date it is fully executed by both parties and shall end on June 30, ~~2005~~ 2006.
 - 6.2 All duties, obligations, and responsibilities required by this Agreement shall be completed no later than June 30, ~~2005~~ 2006. Time shall be deemed to be of the essence in performing the duties, obligations and responsibilities required by this Agreement.
3. The effective date of this Third Amendment shall be on the date it is fully executed by both parties.
4. Except as set forth herein, all of the terms and conditions contained within the Agreement, as amended, shall remain in full force and effect and are incorporated herein by reference.
5. In the event of any conflict or ambiguity between this Amendment and the Agreement, the parties hereto hereby agree that this document shall control.
6. Capitalized terms not otherwise defined herein shall have the meanings set forth in the Agreement.
7. This document incorporates and includes all prior negotiations, correspondence, conversations, agreements, and understandings applicable to the matters contained herein and the parties agree that there are no commitments, agreements, or understandings concerning the subject matter of this document that are not contained in this document. Accordingly, the parties agree that no deviation from the terms hereof shall be predicated upon any prior representations or agreements, whether oral or written.
8. Preparation of the Agreement, as amended, has been a joint effort of SCHOOL BOARD and COUNTY and the resulting document shall not, solely as a matter of judicial construction, be construed more severely against one of the parties than any other.
9. Except as set forth in the Agreement, as amended, no modification, amendment, or alteration in the terms or conditions contained in the Agreement, as amended, shall be effective unless contained in a written document and executed by the parties hereto.

10. SCHOOL BOARD hereby irrevocably submits to the jurisdiction of Florida's state or federal courts in any action or proceeding arising out of or relating to the Agreement, as amended and hereby irrevocably agrees that all claims in respect to such action or proceeding may be heard and determined in Broward County, Florida, the venue situs. The parties agree that the Agreement, as amended, shall be construed and interpreted according to the laws of the State of Florida. To encourage prompt and equitable resolution of any litigation that may arise hereunder, the parties hereby waive any rights either may have to a trial by jury of any such litigation.
11. In the event the Agreement, as amended, or a portion of the Agreement, as amended, is found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, the remaining provisions shall continue to be effective unless COUNTY or SCHOOL BOARD elects to terminate the Agreement. The election to terminate the Agreement based upon this provision shall be made within seven (7) days after the finding by the court becomes final.
12. The truth and accuracy of each "Whereas" clause set forth above is acknowledged by the parties.
13. This Amendment may be executed in up to three (3) counterparts, each of which shall be deemed to be an original.

4n Environmental Mindset

Broward County's Tradewinds Elementary School knows about environmentalism. The school's fifth-graders, lead by teacher Jill Putney,



have spearheaded a campaign to beautify their community by kicking off a recycling and street adoption program part of the 2005 Jiminy Cricket's Environmental Challenge. The students who call themselves "the Butterfly Brigade" adopted Park School Road (which runs along the school) and Coconut Creek's Lakeside Park. As part of their project, they collect recyclable materials from the road and

park. "My class is extremely excited to get started on this project," said Putney. "They are getting ready to teach the other classes about recycling and its benefits, as well as getting outside and keeping their adopted street clean." Jiminy Cricket's Environmental Challenge is the result of a partnership between Walt Disney World Co. and the State of Florida Department of Environmental Protection to promote environmental education and action. The program focuses on fifth-grade students throughout Florida's public school system and invites them to get directly

involved by learning about the environment and promoting the conservation of resources in their community. Last year more than 12,000 Florida students made a pledge to take action to help the environment and over 65 extensive environmental programs were submitted.

Putney's kid's efforts have not gone unnoticed; the City of Coconut Creek dedicated a sign at the site to mark

the street "adopted" by the students and donated butterfly t-shirts to the children. Choice Medical Centers and Waste and Recycling Services have also jumped on board and are assisting the kids with their project. "If a class of thirty-one kids can make this much of a difference, imagine what an entire community can do," said Putney.

Second Amendment to Extend Interlocal Agreement with Broward County Government for Joint Comprehensive School Recycling Services

REQUESTED ACTION:
Approve the Second Amendment to the Interlocal Agreement to extend the recycling services program for the upcoming school years, July 1, 2004 – June 30, 2006.

SUMMARY EXPLANATION AND BACKGROUND:
On October 19, 1999, The School Board of Broward County, Florida approved a multi-year interlocal agreement with Broward County Government to provide a comprehensive recycling program at all schools and administrative sites. This agreement was extended through the First Amendment by The School Board of Broward County, Florida and the Broward County Board of Commissioners on June 18, 2002, through the 2003-04 school year. The Second Amendment extends comprehensive paper/cardboard recycling services to all public schools and administrative sites through 2004-06 school years. The financial impact to the school system for recycling services has remained unchanged since the 2002-03 school year.

The recycling program is a joint cooperative effort between The School Board of Broward County, Florida and Broward County Government. Both parties seek to support Florida's Solid Waste Reduction Act of 1988, and promotes recycling as a viable method of waste reduction.

Mrs. Andrews was absent for the vote. Ms. Carter voted "no." (7-1 vote)

May 18, 2004

In July 1992, The School Board of Broward County, Florida initiated a comprehensive recycling program with Broward County Government. Since its inception, the program has recycled in excess of 38,648,000 pounds of paper and cardboard products. Through the interlocal agreement, the following services are provided by Broward County Government:

- On-site weekly pickup of commingled paper products at schools and locations by contract vendor, Waste Management Inc.
- Supply paper recycling dumpster containers to all schools and administrative sites.
- Supply all classrooms recycling bins and plastic bags for recycling commingled material.
- Inputting the daily route sheets provided by Waste Management to track the number of collections and maintain inventory of the number and type of recycling containers used to collect materials.
- Publish bi-monthly Recycling Report Card that lists recycling tonnage's for each school and facility. Elementary and middle school students receive the quarterly Trash Talk newsletter through the Office of Integrated Waste Management.
- Student recycling aides, from the Office of Integrated Waste Management provide presentations to School Board staff and students, deliver program literature and promotional materials. During FY 2002-03, student recycling aides trained nearly 20,000 students and School Board staff on recycling and waste reduction activities. The student recycling aides monitor program collections and work with school staffs to resolve program issues and problems.
- Broward County Board of Commissioners and The School Board of Broward County, Florida partnered the successful America Recycles Day Group Pledge. Over 16,500 pledge cards were collected from elementary students. This effort is the largest group pledge in the history of the America Recycles Day program.

The comprehensive joint recycling program is recognized as a national model. The program has received the following national and regional awards:

- U.S. Conference of Mayors National Recycling in Schools Program for Innovative Recycling and Environmental Education Programs
- South Florida EEO Awards for Environmental Action
- U.S. Conference of Mayors National Leadership Awards/National Office paper Recycling Program Award for Effective Employees Education and Environmental Tracking
- Recycle Florida Today's Best School Recycling Program
- Keep Florida Beautiful Annual Environmental Public Service Award

The past two school years, the school system has recycled approximately 8,600,000 pounds of cardboard and paper, the equivalent of 4,300 tons. Our students are taught that sixteen trees make one ton of virgin paper. Through recycling, students are actively engaged in preserving our ecosystem, over 68,000 trees were saved in the last two years alone.

Recycling is a labor-intensive endeavor. The expectation is that recycling service will be provided free of charge. Strong markets exist for aluminum cans and plastic bottles when they can be delivered to market in significant quantities. Market prices for commingled paper products do not cover the costs of recycling services. However, due to ongoing cost control efforts, the cost for our paper/cardboard recycling services has not increased the past two years. There is no increase in recycling costs for the 2004-05 and 2005-06 school years. In fact, it is anticipated that for the first time revenues of \$22,000 will be generated through the recycling program.

The agreement has been approved as to form by the School Board Attorney. Broward County Government will act on the agreement at their Commission meeting on June 1, 2004.

This is a Second Amendment to the Agreement ("Agreement") between BROWARD COUNTY ("COUNTY"), a political subdivision of the State of Florida, by and through its Board of County Commissioners, hereinafter referred to as "COUNTY,"

AND

The SCHOOL BOARD OF BROWARD COUNTY, FLORIDA, hereinafter referred to as the "SCHOOL BOARD,"

WHEREAS, the COUNTY and SCHOOL BOARD entered into an Agreement for recycling services under the Broward County Recycling Program, on October 26, 1999, which was amended by the First Amendment, dated June 25, 2002, (collectively "Agreement"); and

WHEREAS, the current Agreement expires on June 30, 2004; and

WHEREAS, the parties desire to amend the Agreement to provide for an additional one year term; NOW, THEREFORE,

IN CONSIDERATION of the mutual promises and covenants contained herein, and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto hereby agree to amend the Agreement as follows:

- 1. The foregoing recitals are true and correct and incorporated herein by reference.**

2. Article 6, entitled "TERM AND TERMINATION," subsections 6.1 and 6.2 of the Agreement are hereby amended to read as follows:
 - 6.1 The term of this Agreement shall begin on the date it is fully executed by both parties and shall end on June 30, 2004 2005.
 - 6.2 All duties, obligations, and responsibilities required by this Agreement shall be completed no later than June 30, 2004 2005. Time shall be deemed to be of the essence in performing the duties, obligations and responsibilities required by this Agreement.
3. The effective date of this Second Amendment shall be on the date it is fully executed by both parties.
4. Except as set forth herein, all of the terms and conditions contained within the Agreement, as amended, shall remain in full force and effect and are incorporated herein by reference.
5. In the event of any conflict or ambiguity between this Amendment and the Agreement, the parties hereto hereby agree that this document shall control.
6. Capitalized terms not otherwise defined herein shall have the meanings set forth in the Agreement.
7. This document incorporates and includes all prior negotiations, correspondence, conversations, agreements, and understandings applicable to the matters contained herein and the parties agree that there are no commitments, agreements, or understandings concerning the subject matter of this document that are not contained in this document. Accordingly, the parties agree that no deviation from the terms hereof shall be predicated upon any prior representations or agreements, whether oral or written.
8. Preparation of the Agreement, as amended, has been a joint effort of SCHOOL BOARD and COUNTY and the resulting document shall not, solely as a matter of judicial construction, be construed more severely against one of the parties than any other.
9. Except as set forth in the Agreement, as amended, no modification, amendment, or alteration in the terms or conditions contained in the Agreement, as amended, shall be effective unless contained in a written document and executed by the parties hereto.

10. SCHOOL BOARD hereby irrevocably submits to the jurisdiction of Florida's state or federal courts in any action or proceeding arising out of or relating to the Agreement, as amended and hereby irrevocably agrees that all claims in respect to such action or proceeding may be heard and determined in Broward County, Florida, the venue situs. The parties agree that the Agreement, as amended, shall be construed and interpreted according to the laws of the State of Florida. To encourage prompt and equitable resolution of any litigation that may arise hereunder, the parties hereby waive any rights either may have to a trial by jury of any such litigation.
11. In the event the Agreement, as amended, or a portion of the Agreement, as amended, is found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, the remaining provisions shall continue to be effective unless COUNTY or SCHOOL BOARD elects to terminate the Agreement. The election to terminate the Agreement based upon this provision shall be made within seven (7) days after the finding by the court becomes final.
12. The truth and accuracy of each "Whereas" clause set forth above is acknowledged by the parties.
13. This Amendment may be executed in up to three (3) counterparts, each of which shall be deemed to be an original.


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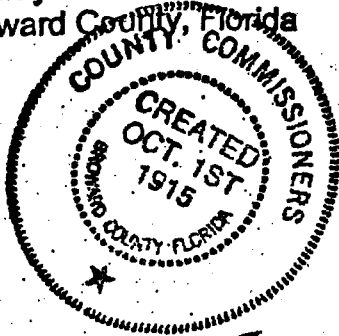

In July 1992, the School Board of Broward County, Florida initiated a comprehensive recycling program with Broward County Government. Since its inception, the program has recycled in excess of 26,581,998 pounds of paper and cardboard products. The recycling program is a joint cooperative effort in support of the Florida's Solid Waste Reduction Act of 1988 to promote recycling as a viable method of waste reductions.

Through the interlocal agreement, the following services are provided by Broward County:

- On-site weekly pickup of commingled paper products at schools and locations by contract vendor, Waste Management Inc.
- Supply paper recycling dumpster containers to all schools and administrative sites,
- Supply all classrooms recycling bins and plastic bags for recycling commingled material,
- Inputting the daily route sheets provided by Waste Management to track the number of collections, and maintain inventory of the number and type of recycling containers used to collect materials. Publish Recycling Report Card that updates schools on monthly pounds of materials collected,
- A recycling assistant is available to handle calls concerning missed collections, questions about recycling, starting or increasing service and scheduling training. The assistant also performs follow-up telephone service to random schools to ascertain service quality of vendor,
- Site visits are done annually by county recycling staff to each school and administrative faculty to audit their solid waste and recycling services. Meetings are conducted with the Head Facilities Servicepersons to review quality of service and make recommendations regarding recycling, and
- Last school year, educational outreach programs were provided to more than 13,066 students and faculty members. This number will exceed 15,000 for school year 2001-02. Educational training is provided through classroom presentations, the 5th Grade Challenge program, introductory recycling program "How to Recycle" in school and at home, career days and site visits.

The comprehensive joint recycling program is recognized as a national model. The program has received the following national and regional awards:

- U.S. Conference of Mayor's National Recycling in Schools Program for Innovative Recycling and Environment Education Programs.
- South Florida ECO Awards for Environmental Action.
- U.S. Conference of Mayor's National Leadership Awards/National Office Paper Recycling Program Award for Effective Employees Education and Environmental Trucking.

Last school year (2000-01), the school system recycled approximately 3,970,000 pounds of cardboard and paper, the equivalent of 1,985 tons. Our students are taught that sixteen trees make one ton of virgin paper. Annually, our students and employees are conserving 31,760 trees in our ecosystem. Through recycling, students are actively engaged in preserving our most threatened ecosystem, old growth forests.

Despite advances in technology, such as computers and email, the global consumption of paper is sharply rising, increasing at a 3% rate per year. According to the Resource Conservation Alliance, the average American consumes almost 750 pounds of paper products annually ... the world's highest consumption rate. Communicating through technological advances has not diminished America's appetite for paper nor diminished the need for resource recovery through recycling.

Recycling services are not provided by haulers or waste management companies free of charge. The expectation is that recycling services will be available free, with all costs covered by the market prices. Market prices for commingled paper products, do not cover the costs of labor, transportation and overhead for recycling services. Since 1999, the cost to the School Board for recycling services has remained at \$425,000. The contract extension increases the amount paid to Broward County Government from \$425,000 to \$467,000. This increase is requested due to rate increases from the hauler, and additional schools to be serviced. The rate of \$467,000 is guaranteed through June 30, 2004. All new schools opening the 2002-03 and 2003-04 school year, will be provided recycling services through this agreement.

The School Board and Broward County Board of County Commissioners formed a partnership in 1992 to provide recycling collection, training, and education at all public schools and administrative facilities. This partnership has resulted in many awards and fostered innovative educational experiences for students and teachers alike. Broward County's Office of Integrated Waste Management has managed the recycling collection services, provided training for students, teachers and janitorial employees (what is recyclable and associated operational procedures) and handled complaint resolution, a complete package. The current agreement between the School Board and Broward County expires June 30, 2002, but may be extended for two (2) additional one (1) year periods.

This program has a positive daily impact on more than 240,000 students and 20,000 employees at 212 schools and administrative complexes. The impact of the recycling program has been significant. Since the inception of the program 26,581,998 pounds of paper, cardboard and commingled materials have been recycled by the school system. The schools produced 3,970,000 pounds in Fiscal Year (FY) 2001. We project, using current figures, that the schools will produce more than 4,600,000 pounds (2,300 tons) of recycling by the end of FY 2002.

The Broward County Schools Recycling Program has been recognized nationally as an innovative example of excellence in recycling and has received more than eight (8) awards over the life of the program, including the U. S. Conference of Mayors' National Recycling in Schools Program for Innovative Recycling and Environmental Education Programs, South Florida ECO Award for Environmental Action, and Recycle Florida Today's "Best School Recycling Program" (nomination), just to name a few.

Last year we provided education to more than 13,066 students and faculty at the schools, and this year we expect to educate 15,000 students and faculty members. This has been, and will be accomplished through classroom presentations, the 5th Grade Challenge, outreach programs, special events, and site visits with faculty and janitorial employees.



Since the inception of the current agreement on October 26, 1999 the School Board has paid \$425,000.00 annually for recycling services. However, the cardboard and paper being recycled has increased. We have added more than thirteen (13) additional sites for the schools and endured two rate increases from the hauler resulting in an increase in the County's operational cost. We are requesting that you not only approve the contract extension but the amendment to increase the amount paid from \$425,000.00 to \$467,000.00 annually. This will cover additional cost of recycling over the next two extension periods and allow us to continue existing services and add any new service locations. This increase keeps pace with inflationary costs and school system growth.

The extension of the agreement between the School Board and Broward County's Board of County Commissioners must be approved and completed by June 30, 2002 to avoid interruption of service. The County staff has worked closely with Mr. Damian Huttenhoff, Director of Student Support, and we understand that staff recommends the extension of this cooperative program, including the cost adjustment.

I seek your endorsement and request timely execution of the County - School Board Amended Agreement before the June 30, 2002 deadline.

Interlocal Agreement with Broward County Government for Joint Comprehensive School Recycling Program

REQUESTED ACTION:

It is requested that The School Board of Broward County, Florida approve the Agreement with Broward County Government to continue comprehensive school recycling services through the 2001-2002 school year (November 1, 1999 - June 30, 2002). Broward County Government is acting on this same item at the October 26, 1999, commission meeting.

SUMMARY EXPLANATION AND BACKGROUND:

On July 21, 1992, the School Board approved an agreement with Broward County Government to develop a comprehensive recycling program for all schools and administrative locations. Since its inception, the program has recycled in excess of 17,434,000 pounds of materials. At present, the program is in place at over 200 schools and administrative complexes.

The recycling program is a joint cooperative effort between the School Board and the County. Both parties seek to support the Florida's Solid Waste Reduction Act of 1988, and promote recycling as a viable method of waste reduction.

MAJOR SYSTEM PRIORITY:

Improving Student Achievement and School Effectiveness

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

The financial impact to the School District is \$425,000. Approximately \$263,000 of this amount is a continuation of the existing recycling program and is funded through the School District's Waste Management/Utility Account. The additional cost to the district is \$162,000 and will also be funded through the School District's Waste Management/Utility Account.

BROWARD COUNTY GOVERNMENT/BROWARD COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS JOINT RECYCLE PROGRAM

Since 1992, the School Board and Broward County Board of County Commissioners have formed a unique partnership to provide recycling collection, training, and education at all public schools and administrative buildings. This comprehensive program has a positive impact daily on the 240,000 students and 20,000 employees located at over 200 schools and administrative complexes. The impact of the recycling program has been significant. Since inception of the program over 17,434,000 pounds of paper have been recycled by the school system.

The school system's recycling program is the largest paper recycling program in the Nation for K-12 institutions. Our program has been recognized at the local, State, and National levels. Awards presented to the school system include:

- U.S. Conference of Mayors National Recycling in Schools Program for Innovative Recycling and Environmental Education Programs.
- U.S. Conference of Mayors National Leadership Awards/National Office Paper Recycling Programs:
 - Effective Employees Education -- 1995
 - Environmental Tracking -- 1996
- South Florida ECO Awards for Environmental Action (second place for all South Florida Businesses)
- Recycle Florida Today's Best School Recycling Program and
- ~~1997-Keep-Florida-Beautiful-Annual-Environmental-Public-Service-Award.~~

With the assistance of Broward County Government, a comprehensive recycling education program has been developed for students. Education through the schools has become an integral part of the programs success. By making recycling a daily activity of a child's everyday life, valuable life actions are developed that have long-term impacts on our community and the environment.

Specific educational activities coordinated with Broward County Government include:

- Fifth Grade Challenge - This program provides elementary school seniors detected information on recycling and all aspects of waste management in Broward County.
- Children's Recycling Fair - This interactive event reinforces positive recycling activities and
- Broward County Educational Environmental Fair - This fair provides teachers the opportunity to earn inservice points through environmental course work. The fair is conducted annually during the first week in November.

The recycling program is accountable through the Recycling Report Card. This monthly newsletter provides information on school recycling activities. The Report Card tracks each school's recycling rate. The information is provided in pounds collected, pounds collected and pounds per student. Schools are provided the Report Card at the conclusion of each month.

During the 1998-99 school year the recycling vendor, Planet Recycle experienced financial difficulties. Recycling service for Broward County Government and Broward County Public Schools was erratic and less than satisfactory. By the conclusion of the school year Planet Recycle went out of business. Browning-Ferris Industries (BFI) is providing recycling services on a temporary basis through October 31, 1999.

In May 1999 Broward County Government issued a formal request of interest to develop a new collection contract that will continue our joint recycling program. The company selected to provide the comprehensive recycling program services is Waste Management Technologies. Waste Management Technologies will initiate service on November 1, 1999.

The annual cost for providing recycling services to the school system is \$425,000. This includes weekly pickup of paper and cardboard recycled materials, recycling carts and containers for all schools. In addition through Broward County Government and Waste Management Technologies waste management audits at schools and facilities will be conducted. The waste management audits will result in down sizing garbage service levels, thereby reducing the districts overall waste management costs.

Since 1994 the cost for providing recycling services has remained constant at \$263,000. Although the cost of living and operation have increased we have been able to maintain our costs without increases. However, the recycling industry is very fluid and pricing fluctuates constantly. Waste Management Technologies is a fortune 500 company with the financial strength and reliability to survive the market fluctuations in the recycling market place. The increased costs to the school system to provide annual recycling services under this agreement is \$162,000.

This Agreement dated the _____ day of _____, 1999, by and between BROWARD COUNTY, a political subdivision of the State of Florida, by and through its Board of County Commissioners, hereinafter referred to as "COUNTY,"

and

The SCHOOL BOARD OF BROWARD COUNTY, FLORIDA, hereinafter referred to as the "SCHOOL BOARD."

WHEREAS, COUNTY and SCHOOL BOARD have determined that in support of the Broward County Recycling Program (which was created pursuant to Florida's Solid Waste Reduction Act of 1988) it is in their mutual best interest to enter into a cooperative agreement on certain issues relating to the provision of recycling services; and

WHEREAS, COUNTY desires continued compliance with State of Florida regulations, and seeks to provide recycling services in its effort to meet Florida's solid waste reduction goal; and

WHEREAS, SCHOOL BOARD desires to receive recycling services under said program and COUNTY's provision of such, would aid COUNTY in complying with the Florida Solid Waste Reduction Act of 1988; and

WHEREAS, to augment education regarding conservation of our resources and recycling, the COUNTY desires to join with the SCHOOL BOARD to provide a Joint Comprehensive Recycling Program and, in so doing, permit SCHOOL BOARD schools and facilities to actively participate; and

WHEREAS, a Joint Comprehensive Recycling Program between the SCHOOL BOARD and the COUNTY decreases the SCHOOL BOARD's need for waste disposal services, thereby reducing its cost of waste management expenses; and

WHEREAS, the terms and conditions of this Agreement incorporate negotiations undertaken between COUNTY and SCHOOL BOARD for a Joint Comprehensive Recycling Program; NOW, THEREFORE,

IN CONSIDERATION of the foregoing premises, and the mutual conditions and covenants contained herein, the parties hereto, intending to be legally bound, do hereby agree as follows:

ARTICLE 1 RECITATIONS

The parties agree that the foregoing recitations are true and correct and are hereby incorporated as if fully set out herein.

ARTICLE 2 CERTAIN DEFINITIONS

As used herein, the following terms shall be the meanings set forth below:

- 2.1 Agreement - means this document, Articles 1 through 9, inclusive. Other terms and conditions are included in the exhibits and documents that are expressly incorporated by reference.
- 2.2 Contract Administrator - means the Director of the Recycling and Contract Administration Division.
- 2.3 Project - means the provision, by COUNTY, of waste audits, training, education, and advice on solid waste services to promote compliance with the Florida Solid Waste Management Act of 1988 and effectuates the Joint Comprehensive Recycling Program.
- 2.4 Project Director - means the COUNTY employee directed by the Contract Administrator, in writing, to be responsible for the administration of this Agreement as it pertains to policy, procedures, and services rendered by the SCHOOL BOARD.
- 2.5 Project Manager - means the SCHOOL BOARD employee designated, in writing, by the Superintendent of Schools, to coordinate with the Project Director for

the delivery of services to School District as defined by the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

- 2.6 **School Board Facilities** - means Broward County School Board Facilities and all designated public schools within the County as described in Exhibit "1".

ARTICLE 3 **SCOPE OF SERVICES**

The following services shall be provided by COUNTY, utilizing personnel with expertise in the area of recycling, in cooperation with SCHOOL BOARD for the Joint Comprehensive Recycling Program:

- 3.1 COUNTY shall provide all designated public schools and School Board Facilities with paper and cardboard recycling service. Such programs shall include once a week scheduled pickup service.
- 3.2 COUNTY shall continue to provide program development and extension services on a regular basis to schools in an effort to keep teachers and students updated and educated on the recycling program. Program development activities shall include: presentations at schools, on-call response services, regular visits to schools, promotional activities, and training of facilities' personnel.
- 3.3 COUNTY, shall provide the PROJECT MANAGER, at least once per month, a written report of the project status. Such report shall include, but not be limited to, information regarding the number of personnel trained, number of containers provided, collection schedules, tonnage of recycled materials collected, and service level recommendations.
- 3.4 COUNTY shall provide waste management audits at schools and facilities, program monitoring, and service level recommendations which shall include downsizing of waste dumpsters.
- 3.5 COUNTY shall manage recycling collection services for SCHOOL BOARD, and ensure complaint resolution, during the Agreement period.
- 3.6 COUNTY, during the Agreement Period, through the Project Director shall, in person or via telephone, counsel SCHOOL BOARD, through the Project Manager, as requested and provide direction as to management, administration, and implementation of the project.

ARTICLE 4
PROJECT

During the Agreement Period, the Project Director shall counsel the Project Manager as requested and provide direction as to management, administration, and implementation of the project.

ARTICLE 5
FUNDING AND METHOD OF PAYMENT

- 5.1 The SCHOOL BOARD shall pay COUNTY Four hundred Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$425,000) for program expenses including, but not limited to, the following: operational costs, salaries, and fringe benefits. The COUNTY shall invoice the SCHOOL BOARD in twelve (12) equal monthly payments. The parties agree that all invoices shall be directed to the Project Manager. Payments shall be made within thirty days of receipt by Project Manager.
- 5.2 Any revenues generated through the sale of material collected under this Agreement less tipping fees, processing, or associated costs shall be divided equally between the SCHOOL BOARD and the COUNTY.

ARTICLE 6
TERM AND TERMINATION

- 6.1 The term of this Agreement shall begin on the date it is fully executed by both parties and shall end on June 30, 2002. Upon mutual agreement of the parties, this Agreement may be extended for two (2) additional one (1) year periods, subject to ninety (90) days' notification, prior to the expiration of the applicable term, by either party's desire to renew.
- 6.2 All duties, obligations, and responsibilities required by this Agreement shall be completed no later than June 30, 2002. Time shall be deemed to be of the essence in performing the duties, obligations and responsibilities required by this Agreement.
- 6.3 This Agreement may be unilaterally terminated by either party, provided that thirty (30) days written notice of such termination is provided. Such notice shall be given in accordance with paragraph 10.3 of Article 10 of this Agreement.
- 6.4 Upon termination of this Agreement by either party, or upon expiration of the term of this Agreement in its normal course, all tangible property provided by the COUNTY for use and benefit of the SCHOOL BOARD shall be delivered to the

COUNTY immediately after the thirty (30) day notice, but not later than the first day after the thirty (30) day notice has expired.

ARTICLE 7 CHANGES IN SCOPE OF SERVICES

Any change to the Scope of Services must be accomplished by a written amendment executed by the parties in accordance with Section 10.12 below, provided however, that the Contract Administrator shall have the authority to add and delete collection sites set forth in Exhibit "1," which shall be kept current at all times.

ARTICLE 8 INDEMNIFICATION

SCHOOL BOARD is a state agency or political subdivision as defined in Chapter 768.28, Florida Statutes, and agrees to be fully responsible for acts and omissions of its agents or employees to the extent permitted by law. Nothing herein is intended to serve as a waiver of sovereign immunity by any party to which sovereign immunity may be applicable. Nothing herein shall be construed as consent by a state agency or political subdivision of the State of Florida to be sued by third parties in any matter arising out of this Agreement or any other contract.

ARTICLE 9 INSURANCE

SCHOOL BOARD is a state agency as defined by Section 768.28, Florida Statutes, and SCHOOL BOARD shall furnish Contract Administrator with written verification of liability protection in accordance with state law prior to final execution of said agreement.

ARTICLE 10 MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

10.1 AUDIT RIGHT AND RETENTION OF RECORDS

COUNTY agrees to keep such records and accounts as may be necessary in order to record complete and correct entries for all costs related to the performance of this Agreement. Such records will be available at all reasonable times for examination, inspection, and audit by SCHOOL BOARD and/or state auditors.

10.2 THIRD PARTY BENEFICIARIES

Neither SCHOOL BOARD nor COUNTY intend to directly or substantially benefit a third party by this Agreement. Therefore, the parties agree that there are no third party beneficiaries to this Agreement and that no third party shall be entitled to

assert a claim against either of them based upon this Agreement. The parties expressly acknowledge that it is not their intent to create any rights or obligations in any third person or entity under this Agreement.

10.3 NOTICES

Whenever either party desires to give notice to the other, such notice must be in writing, sent by certified United States Mail, postage prepaid, return receipt requested, or by hand-delivery with a request for a written receipt of acknowledgment of delivery, addressed to the party for whom it is intended at the place last specified. The place for giving notice shall remain the same as set forth herein until changed in writing in the manner provided in this section. For the present, the parties designate the following:

10.4 ASSIGNMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Neither this Agreement nor any interest herein shall be assigned, transferred, or encumbered by either party.

10.5 CONFLICTS

Neither SCHOOL BOARD nor its employees shall have or hold any continuing or frequently recurring employment or contractual relationship that is substantially antagonistic or incompatible with SCHOOL BOARD's loyal and conscientious exercise of judgment related to its performance under this Agreement.

SCHOOL BOARD agrees that none of its officers or employees shall, during the term of this Agreement, serve as an expert witness against COUNTY in any legal or administrative proceeding in which he or she is not a party, unless compelled by court process. Further, SCHOOL BOARD agrees that such persons shall not give

sworn testimony or issue a report or writing, as an expression of his or her expert opinion, which is adverse or prejudicial to the interests of COUNTY in connection with any such pending or threatened legal or administrative proceeding. The limitations of this section shall not preclude SCHOOL BOARD or any other persons from representing themselves in any action or in any administrative or legal proceeding.

10.6 MATERIALITY AND WAIVER OF BREACH

COUNTY and SCHOOL BOARD agree that each requirement, duty, and obligation set forth herein is substantial and important to the formation of this Agreement and, therefore, is a material term hereof.

COUNTY's failure to enforce any provision of this Agreement shall not be deemed a waiver of such provision or modification of this Agreement. A waiver of any breach of a provision of this Agreement shall not be deemed a waiver of any subsequent breach and shall not be construed to be a modification of the terms of this Agreement.

10.7 COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS

SCHOOL BOARD shall comply with all federal, state, and local laws, codes, ordinances, rules, and regulations in performing its duties, responsibilities, and obligations pursuant to this Agreement.

10.8 SEVERANCE

In the event a portion of this Agreement is found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, the remaining provisions shall continue to be effective unless COUNTY or SCHOOL BOARD elects to terminate this Agreement. An election to terminate this Agreement based upon this provision shall be made within seven (7) days after the finding by the court becomes final.

10.9 JOINT PREPARATION

The parties acknowledge that they have sought and received whatever competent advice and counsel as was necessary for them to form a full and complete understanding of all rights and obligations herein and that the preparation of this Agreement has been their joint effort. The language agreed to expresses their mutual intent and the resulting document shall not, solely as a matter of judicial construction, be construed more severely against one of the parties than the other.

10.10 PRIORITY OF PROVISIONS

If there is a conflict or inconsistency between any term, statement, requirement, or provision of any exhibit attached hereto, any document or events referred to herein, or any document incorporated into this Agreement by reference and a term, statement, requirement, or provision of this Agreement, the term, statement, requirement, or provision contained in Articles 1 through 9 of this Agreement shall prevail and be given effect.

10.11 APPLICABLE LAW AND VENUE

This Agreement shall be interpreted and construed in accordance with and governed by the laws of the State of Florida. Any controversies or legal problems arising out of this Agreement and any action involving the enforcement or interpretation of any rights hereunder shall be submitted to the jurisdiction of the State courts of the Seventeenth judicial Circuit of Broward County, Florida. By entering into this Agreement, SCHOOL BOARD and COUNTY hereby expressly waive any rights either party may have to a trial by jury of any civil litigation related to, or arising out of the Project.

10.12 AMENDMENTS

No modification, amendment, or alteration in the terms or conditions contained herein shall be effective unless contained in a written document prepared with the same or similar formality as this Agreement and executed by the COUNTY and SCHOOL BOARD.

10.13 PRIOR AGREEMENTS

This document incorporates and includes all prior negotiations, correspondence, conversations, agreements, and understandings applicable to the matters contained herein and the parties agree that there are no commitments, agreements or understandings concerning the subject matter of this Agreement that are not contained in this document. Accordingly, the parties agree that no deviation from the terms hereof shall be predicated upon any prior representations or agreements, whether oral or written. It is further agreed that no modification, amendment or alteration in the terms or conditions contained herein shall be effective unless set forth in writing in accordance with Section 10.12 above.

10.14 INCORPORATION BY REFERENCE

The truth and accuracy of each "Whereas" clause set forth above is acknowledged by the parties. The attached Exhibit "1" is incorporated into and made a part of this Agreement.

10.15 MULTIPLE ORIGINALS

This Agreement may be fully executed in four (4) copies by all parties, each of which, bearing original signatures, shall have the force and effect of an original document.



Peanuts

Many packing and shipping stores will take back loose fill packaging. In fact, 45 million pounds is reused each year (a reuse ratio of 50 percent).

What You Can Do to Reuse Packaging:

1. Use all types of bags as often as possible. They make good trash can liners, diaper bags, beach bags and school bags. In many areas of the country, supermarkets will actually reimburse you for bringing bags back and using them again.
2. Use cardboard and plastic egg cartons to hold and sort arts & craft supplies. They hold beads, buttons, nails and other small objects. So do margarine tubs, yogurt cups and deli containers.
3. Reuse packing materials like foam peanuts or "bubble wrap." Store them in reusable bags and boxes, or take them to private mail and packaging stores. Many of these stores have programs in place to recycle these materials.

What You Can Do to Source Reduce:

Here are some easy ways to make source reduction part of your everyday shopping habits:

1. Look for products with reduced packaging. For example, many deodorants have done away with the bulky outer paper box, leaving just

the functional container. New toothpaste tubes have also reduced packaging materials, in some cases by as much as 30 to 40 percent.

2. Use concentrated products, like fabric softener refills. Also, powdered detergents are now available in concentrated form - you get a lot

more washes from a far smaller box.

3. Use lightweight packages that hold a lot of product without adding much weight. Aluminum cans, paper and plastic milk containers and juice boxes are good examples.

4. Buy larger sizes. A one-pound box uses less material than two half-pound boxes. Remember though, if you buy larger quantities than you can use in a reasonable amount of time, spoilage and subsequent waste may outweigh the reduced packaging benefits.

5. Don't take what you don't need, and make the most of what you can do. Try to consolidate groceries or merchandise into fewer bags. Or, skip the bag if you can. If you can't, fill it up before reaching for another.

Plastics - Be like Mike

For those who wish to practice their slam dunks in an environmentally correct way, Huffy Sports, Sussex, Wisc., offers a product that will help. The company claims to be the only backboard manufacturer in the world to use post-consumer recycled material in its products.

Specifically, Huffy Sports makes backboards from discarded landfill bound plastics and other materials. The result is a line of products the company calls durable and high performance.

Huffy Sports has teamed up with

Composite Technologies Corp. of Dayton, Ohio, the makers of Polymer Fiber Matrix, a compression-molded thermoplastic recycled resin debuted in late 1995, but the company now offers several models with a secondary resin.

"We want to help the environment by taking waste out of landfills and help our customers by offering useful, high-quality, high-value products," says Randy Schickert, Huffy Sports' vice president of global operations. "It is a win-win situation for everyone." (*Recycling Today*, Dec. '98)

RE: Recycling Agreement

Dear Dr. Till:

In November 1994, the School Board and the Broward County Board of County Commissioners formalized a joint partnership that extended recycling to all public schools. This partnership has resulted in numerous awards and fostered innovative educational experiences for students and teachers alike. County Public works staff has managed the recycling collection services, provided training for janitorial employees (what's recyclable and associated operational procedures) and handled complaint resolution-a complete package.

Equally impressive are the extended educational elements that are included in our comprehensive services. The "5th Grade Challenge" provides the elementary school "seniors" detailed information on recycling and integrated waste management. These special presentations help stimulate participation at their schools, present and future. We present Children's Recycling Fairs, conduct paper making workshops, and facilitate many special projects. We provide program outreach at major children-oriented events such as "All About Kids" and "Coast for Kids." Other partnerships with the Young at Art Children's Museum and Museum of Discovery and Science provide extended coverage geared toward students.

Unfortunately, we have learned that revenues from sale of recyclable materials do not cover the collection and processing costs, not to mention the extended educational components. Recycling does save money. Yet, recycling almost 2,000 tons of material is cheaper than disposal. Your administrative staff advises that recycling reduces garbage collection costs more than \$500,000/year.

In May 1999, we issued a formal Request for Letters of Interest to develop a new collection contract that will continue recycling services. We have linked County office complexes and parks in order to gain market advantage; at the same time we forwarded a restated County - School Board Agreement for School Board approval. Costs (\$425,000/year) have increased, but the cost savings and education benefits are still quite evident. We must

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finalize the School Board Agreement before we execute the collection contract with the selected vendor. County staff has worked closely with Mr. Damian Huttenhoff, Director of Administration. I am requesting that you support these efforts and ensure execution of the County - School Board Agreement in early October.
