15	Specified that the health education curriculum for shall include a teen dating violence and abuse component.	F.S., 1003.42(2)(n)
16	Added that successful completion of a high school level Algebra 1, Geometry, or Biology course is not contingent upon the student's performance on the end-of-course (EOC) assessment. However, beginning with the 2011-12 school year, to earn high school credit for an Algebra 1 course, a middle school student must pass the Algebra EOC, and beginning with the 2012-13 school year, to earn high school credit for a Geometry or Biology course, a middle school student must pass the Geometry or Biology EOC assessment. 17	Added that one semester of the required three middle school Social Studies courses must include the study of state and federal government and civics education.	F.S., 1003.4156
17	Specified additional requirements to be included in the Career and Education Planning course, which is required for promotion to 9 th grade.	SB4
22	Deleted Major Areas of Interest as a graduation requirement for all cohorts	
23	Specified that the health education curriculum for shall include a teen dating violence and abuse component.	
29	Required that for courses that require EOCs, a minimum of 30 percent of a student's course grade shall be comprised of performance on the EOC.	
30	Clarified that EOCs are required by statute and therefore not eligible for exam exemptions.	
39	Changed the graduation credit and EOC requirements for Math and Science	
41	Changed the graduation assessment requirements for the 2010-11 cohort.	
41	Eliminated the requirement for a student to attempt the FCAT three times prior to using a concordant ACT/SAT score.	
42	Added an option for ESE students to waive the EOC requirements.	
45-61	Revised the graduation charts to reflect the current graduation requirements for each cohort.	
45-61	Changed the titles of American History and American Government to United States History and United States Government.
